2010 New Zealand Brass Band Championships

The 2010 New Zealand Brass Band Championships were held in Dunedin in July, and hosted by the three local bands — St Kilda Brass, Kaikorai Metropolitan Brass, and Mosgiel Brass. Unfortunately, none of the local bands were able to gain places in their respective aggregate competitions, although the members of St Kilda were thoroughly pleased with their performance of Kevin Norbury's *Odyssey* in the Own Choice section. This was followed on the final day of the championships by a performance in the *Band of the Year* event. Although the band did not win this event, it put on a very entertaining programme, opening with Lionel Ritchie's *All Night Long* and featuring singing from Gladys Hope and tap dancing from Gina Miles and Melinda Joe, and ending with a bang with Paul Lovatt-Cooper's *Walking with Heroes*.

Obituary – Bill Fraser

It is with sadness that we report the passing of Bill Fraser recently, after a long illness. Bill learned to play the cornet in the Kaikorai Band and then switched to St Kilda. He was chosen to play in the 1953 National Band of New Zealand, which toured England, and was successful in winning the Belle Vue Contest in Manchester. Bill came back to New Zealand and played for St Kilda, then business took him to Invercargill, and then Oamaru. Bill was prominent in Rotary and local politics in Oamaru and after his retirement he moved to Wanaka, then because of his health settled in Christchurch. Bill was always interested in brass bands and supported anything worthwhile for the brass band movement. Although never actively a member of the Woolston Band, some members of Woolston, joined by several of his friends from the 1953 National Band, played hymns at Bill's funeral. They appropriately played Cwym Rhonda, a favourite of the 1953 band, and Bill's favourite march, Invercargill, as the casket was carried out of the service.

National Secondary Schools' Brass Band 2010

Two of our front row cornet players, Rosie Evans and Kalie Eathorne-Gould, are pleased to have been selected again to play in the National Secondary Schools Brass Band. Kalie has been selected on second cornet, and Rosie on flugelhorn. They are two of only a handful of players selected from the south.

This year, the course will be held in Brightwater, near Nelson, in October. The band will be directed by Mick Dowrick (Nelson City Brass, Nelson Symphony Orchestra) and Nick Sharpe (director of the Nelson Brass Academy, Tasman Brass Ensemble).

Concerts will be performed at the Theatre Royal in Nelson. Repertoire performed will include music from Henry VIII, all the way to music from the soundtrack to the movie *The Incredibles*.

Class Act - Kalie Eathorne-Gould

The study of music and mutations are the building blocks of Kalie Eathorne-Gould's (17) world.

The Kavanagh College pupil is an accomplished musician, but she is also the school's top female maths and science pupil and hopes to create a career in genetics.

"There are people out there who suffer from disease caused by genetic mutations. It would be life-fulfilling to be able to help those people."

Her academic transcript puts her in good stead, with excellence endorsements in NCEA levels 1 and 2.

Kalie is a cornet player in the St Kilda Brass Band and the New Zealand Secondary Schools Brass Band, and plays trumpet in the Dunedin Youth Orchestra and Octagon City Big Band.

She has achieved Grade 7 in the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music cornet and theory examinations, Grade 6 in violin, and Grade 7 (high distinction) in the Saint Cecilia School of Music singing exam.

She was awarded the school's senior Cultural Trophy last year for her performances with the school orchestra, show band, jazz band and Acapella Choir.

Kalie says a highlight of her musical career so far was being selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools Brass Band last year.

"It was great being around like-minded people. It is the thing I am most proud of."

While music provides challenges for Kalie, it is also her favourite "spare time" activity.

Every teenage girl has a certain amount of angst and emotion, and music is an easy way for her to vent it.

"It's stress relief and it allows me to share how I'm feeling with other people."

Spending almost every night of the week at rehearsals or concerts provides Kalie's greatest challenge.

She says finding time to do school work and music is difficult, but manages to find balance by being well organised and "often working late at night".

Review – Brass plus opera just the ticket

If you love opera and like brass bands, or just love brass bands and like opera, then you should have been in the Mayfair audience on Saturday night [21 August] when St Kilda Brass and three opera singers presented "A Night at the Opera".

The band was in great form, and never too loud for the venue, as musical director Steve Miles conducted and compered an excellent programme. Well defined dynamics and mellow tone set the standard, opening with Grand March from Tannhauser and operatic favourites followed thick and fast until the final riotous arrangement of Offenbach's Can Can. The success of this genre fusion is mainly due to discerning arrangements of original orchestral scores. Borodin's Polovtsian Dances, arranged by Howard Snell, proved ideal for brass, and Flower Duet from Lakme by Delibes received subtle soprano and mezzo tones from soprano cornet [Ralph Miller] and cornet [Katie Blair] soloists. A crossover for In the Depths of the Temple with baritone [John McAdam] and euphonium [Matthew Toomata] was equally successful. A solo euphonium [Davey Boyes] performance of Nessun Dorma accentuated the beauty of melody in this Pavarotti signature tune.


A highlight was another Snell arrangement – *Procession to the Minster* (Wagner), a powerful work with excellent part playing through legato passages and clear melodic enunciation.

Three of Isabel Cunningham's voice students, Christie Cook, Julien Van Mellaerts and Kawiti Waetford, contributed several opera arias – all strong voices and at no time swamped by brass.

Altogether a great evening's entertainment.

The concert helped raise the tens of thousands of dollars needed (on top of several million) to redevelop the Dunedin icon, and also gave the band a chance to test the venue just before it was used for the national contest.
